Social media campaign seeks to raise awareness of vehicular heatstroke

Vehicular heatstroke is one of the leading causes of death among children. It only takes 10 minutes for a vehicle's temperature to rise over 20 degrees, even with the windows cracked. With windows closed if the temperature outside is 60 degrees, the inside of your car or van can reach 110 degrees. Babies and young children are especially susceptible to heatstroke. A child dies when their body temperature reaches 109 degrees.



With these facts in mind, the Office of Early Learning is running a social media campaign throughout the month of September to raise awareness of the risk of vehicular heatstroke. The campaign will use **#doublechecktheback** to remind parents, child care providers and caregivers of the importance of double checking the backseat when traveling with a child.

Coalition receives "Officer Friendly" donation

ELC of Flagler & Volusia receives a \$2,500 donation to partner with Ormond Police Department

The [Early Learning Coalition of Flagler & Volusia](#) received a \$2,500 donation from The William J. Voges Foundation to partner with the Ormond Beach Police Department in bringing the "Officer Friendly" Program to Ormond Beach.

Each month starting in September, Ormond Beach police officers will visit selected early learning programs to read stories to preschool-age children. Stories will focus on building children's self-esteem, developing their social skills and creating positive relationships with police officers.

Coalition program works to end the "summer slide"

VPK Completers program reinforces learning during summer

This summer, the [ELC of Indian River, Martin and Okeechobee Counties](#) was awarded a grant from the Martin County Board of County Commissioners to provide additional education to VPK students in an effort to prevent what is commonly known as the "summer slide."



Twenty participants who completed VPK in Martin County benefited from the opportunity to continue in an additional eight-week program that would reinforce what they had learned during the year.

The VPK Completers program provided three hours of instruction, four days a week, and was held at Apple Tree Academy in Jensen Beach, Florida. Areas of focus included phonological awareness, print knowledge, oral language/vocabulary, and mathematics, which are components of the VPK assessment designed to measure skills needed in kindergarten.

Coalitions, organizations gather for a lesson on conscious discipline

Special guest Ginny Luther explained how to apply conscious discipline to early education

For three days in early August, 68 child care teachers, elementary school teachers and community professionals came together to learn and experience the social-emotional learning and classroom management of conscious discipline. The [ELC of St. Lucie County](#), the [ELC of Indian River, Martin and Okeechobee Counties](#), Tykes & Teens and the Christ Family Church in Fort Pierce, Florida, partnered to bring Ginny Luther, loving guidance associate and conscious discipline master instructor, to lead teachers and professionals on the journey to promote permanent behavior change.



Participants had fun while learning about the concept of conscious discipline, created by Dr. Becky Bailey, which equips teachers with skills to integrate social-emotional learning, discipline and self-regulation into their daily interactions with children. Based on current brain research, child development and developmentally appropriate practices, participants experienced activities and stories designed to make changes in their attitudes and behaviors, so in turn, they can change the lives of children.

Longtime coalition board chairman steps down

LENA Grow program will expand to Georgia

Program first utilized by the ELC of Escambia will launch across Georgia

The LENA Grow program, which uses "talk pedometer" technology to measure and provide teachers feedback on their communication with students to increase language interaction in the classroom, has announced its expansion to Georgia. The program will serve 800 children in 16 centers across the state during the first year.



The [ELC of Escambia](#) was one of the first to apply LENA technology in a classroom setting, with overwhelmingly positive results. The coalition also had a hand in naming the program, as it was planned as part of the coalition's Grow With Me Quality Improvement Initiative.

Bruce Watson, executive director of the coalition, expressed his enthusiasm in seeing the program expand, and encourages Florida to follow Georgia's lead in making the program a larger state-sponsored initiative.
