## *Children's book author makes special visit to early learning center*

### Special visit part of the Rotary Read Aloud initiative

Local children's book author Carol "Boots" Hensel visited PCB Academy in Panama City, Fla., during a special visit on Wednesday, Feb. 21. Boots read her story *Johari's Joy* to children while dressed in pig pajamas, and there were guest appearances from her book's stars, Johari and Joy.



The special visit took place thanks to the Rotary Read Aloud program, an initiative between the [Early Learning Coalition of Northwest Florida](#) and the Rotary Club of Panama City. The program started in 2007, and has grown from a partnership with four school readiness contracted providers to 22. Each month, rotarians visit participating Rotary Read Aloud sites in Bay County to read to children. Books and puppets are left with teachers as a gift to the program. Additionally, books are donated through the generous funding of the Rotary Club of Panama City to encourage reading and family engagement in the home. Parents complete pre- and post-Home Literacy Environment Checklists to monitor changes in behavior from the beginning to the end of the program. Parents and teachers also complete comment cards on books provided by the coalition. Books are selected based on the ["Mind in the Making"](#) series of activity sheets with tips to promote life skills.


During the 2016/2017 school year, rotarians spent over 56 hours preparing for and/or reading in school-readiness-contracted programs. Based on feedback data from parents and teachers, parents have become more engaged and have increased the time spent reading to their children. Parents are visiting the library more and are adding books to their home library. Screen time for children has also decreased for children involved with Rotary Read Aloud.



Larry Miller, the dean of education at Florida Southwestern State College, addressed a crowd of nearly 80 business leaders and children's advocates Tuesday, Mar. 6 in Sarasota at the Early Learning Breakfast for Business Champions sponsored by the [ELC of Sarasota](#).



The event celebrated business leaders who were striving to make child care more accessible and affordable for employees. But the morning mostly focused on educating attendees on two main ideas:

Kids entering kindergarten without some sort of preschool are at a fundamental disadvantage, and early education is expensive.

After the breakfast, Miller sat with a group of child care providers, agency leaders and representatives from various foundations and nonprofits to discuss how to address funding shortfalls.

The breakfast also honored three businesses that have expanded access to child care for their employees. Pines of Sarasota Rehabilitation and Senior Care Community, Sarasota Memorial Hospital and PGT Innovations all received recognition for making high quality child care more accessible to their employees.
