The [Early Learning Coalition of Orange County](#) is having a

big night for children June 13. [The First Five Years Gala](#) will honor champions of early education, while raising money to support the coalition's initiatives. Every dollar raised at the gala will bring in \$15.67 in matching donations.



Educators looking to shake up their methods gathered at the Eighth Annual "A Conference of Our Own" in Tallahassee. The event was put on by the [ELC of the Big Bend Region](#) and offered Pre-K, Family Child Care Home and Infant/Toddler learning tracks.

Early educators gathered to focus on the power of words during the Early Childhood Symposium on April 25. Organized by the [ELC of Alachua County](#), event speakers Angela Fraley and DJ Baptiste presented on "Conscious Discipline," a method to transform instances of conflict into teachable moments.

Creative teachers at the [ELC of Flagler and Volusia](#) convert their front lobby into a "dramatic play" area every month. April's theme was



"Deland Post Office." Using donated envelopes, junk mail and magazines, kids wrote letters and stamped envelopes to far-flung corners of the world.

STEM teaching is making its way into early learning classrooms across the state. In St. Lucie County, STEM GEMS (Guided Education Mentors) have been educating fellow teachers on standards. In January, the [ELC of St. Lucie](#) initiated the program in 10 centers, with 18 participating teachers. Now, those core participants are GEMS, who are teaching it to providers throughout the region.



On June 20, the [ELC of the Big Bend Region](#) will host "Fun Science Day," a workshop to increase science's role in the classroom through easy experiments and engaging projects that adhere to STEM standards.

Many early learning coalitions organized events for 2015's Children's Week. The [ELC of Duval](#)

[County](#) held a child advocacy walk through downtown Jacksonville on March 19. The [ELC of Miami Dade](#) brought storybook fun to the Miami Children's Museum as children dressed up in their favorite costumes. And the [ELC of Palm Beach County](#) held reading events throughout the area with local mayors visiting child care centers to read classic stories. Child care providers were celebrated, nationwide, on May 8 for [Provider Appreciation Day](#). Coalitions across the state recognized the dedication of these educators. One event, by the [ELC of Pasco and Hernando](#), brought together more than 50 early learning specialists, administrators and education leaders to highlight this invaluable work.
