While we celebrate our teachers every day, May 8-12 is Teacher Appreciation Week. Take time to recognize your child's teachers. Here is an idea for creating a personal thank you card:

- Have your child pick a colored sheet of construction paper.
- Fold the construction paper in half.
- Write the words "Thank you for helping me learn and grow!" on the front of the card. If your child is an emerging writer and is beginning to use letters to write words or parts of words, allow your child to write the message.
- On the inside of the card, let your child draw a picture using markers or crayons.
- Talk to your child and ask, "What did you write on your card?" and "Who did you create this card for?"

Early Childhood Educators Continuously Learn, Just Like the Kids They Serve!

Florida's School Readiness providers and educators are dedicated to ensuring our state's young future leaders are provided the highest quality of child care and early learning. It's important that providers and educators also continually learn and develop their skills in the classroom through continuing education and professional development. The Division of Early Learning (DEL) provides access to training both online and in-person to accommodate the busy schedules of our early care and education teachers.

DEL has partnered with Florida State University to develop the FSU 10 Components of Quality Care for Infants and Toddlers along with the FSU 10 Components Train-the-Trainer program. The training focuses on the critical components of early learning for infants and toddlers, including topics such as Early Language and Literacy and Family Engagement.

Taking part in professional development allows educators an opportunity to network with others, enhance their teaching skills and understand new initiatives as well as how to incorporate them in their classroom and school environment.

Any child placed away from parents or guardians by a child welfare system into foster care is eligible for Early Head Start for ages birth to 3 and Head Start for ages 3 to 5. Head Start programs are located throughout the state and are accepting applications for the 2023-2024 school year.
